How can you make sure you hear about it? Many counties and cities have a way to register to receive this information. You can also go to google.com/alerts and create an alert through google. The directions are there step by step. In your keywords include words like legislation, regulations, exotic animals, exotic birds, parrots, endangered species. Google will then send you an email with a link to those things as they are announced or published.

The African Grey has been moved to the CITES I list. It remains to be seen how that will affect us in the US. This move will affect the legal trade between countries. There are large breeders in Africa that will be greatly affected.
